Financial Aid Processing Schedule

January 2007

- File Free Application for Federal Financial Aid (FAFSA) as soon as possible after January 1.
- Spring 2007 classes begin January 16, 2007.

March 2007

- **March 15** is the 2007–2008 FAFSA priority filing deadline. (File now!)

April 2007

- Register for Fall 2007 semester classes.
- Summer 2007 financial aid applications are available in the office of Student Financial Aid Services (SFAS) or online at www.njit.edu/info/faforms.

May 2007

- Submit tax forms and any other information, if required, to the office of Student Financial Aid Services as soon as possible but no later than **May 15**.
- Your academic records will be reviewed for Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) after 2007 Spring semester grades are posted.

June 2007

- NJ TAG prior-year recipients must have the FAFSA received by the federal processor by **June 1** for the 2007–2008 academic year.
- Returning student financial aid awarding begins.

July 2007

- Deadline to apply for Summer financial aid is **July 15**.
- Deadline for Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) appeal for Summer is **July 15**.

August 2007

- Tuition bills are sent to registered students for Fall 2007 semester.

September 2007

- Fall 2007 classes begin September 2, 2007.
- Deadline for Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) appeal for Fall is **Sept 1**.

Greetings from the Director

Dear Students:

Happy New Year, and welcome back to campus for the Spring 2007 semester. If you've read our Fall 2006 newsletter, you are aware that the new federal grant programs—both of which cater to technologically inclined students and to those who have completed a rigorous high-school program—are well underway. (If you met the eligibility requirements for either grant, you have been notified in a revised award letter.)

Through NJIT's Student Financial Aid Services (SFAS) office, a large amount of your educational costs can be offset by grants such as these and by additional forms of assistance, including a combination of scholarships, loans, and student employment.

I would like to remind you that, because financial aid eligibility is determined on an annual basis, you must file a FAFSA every year.

March 15, 2007, is the 2007–2008 priority filing deadline, so please don't delay in filing your application!

This newsletter contains important information about applying for financial aid, including the processing deadlines, in order to ensure that you receive every type of financial assistance available to you in a timely fashion. New Scholarship Application Process

Beginning with the 2007–2008 academic year, if you are not a first-time full-time freshman, you must complete and submit a scholarship application form if you want to be considered for additional scholarship funds other than the ones you are automatically considered for as a freshman. You can download the scholarship application form after January 30, 2007, at www.njit.edu/info/faforms.

Little-Known Facts About Financial Aid

- Income is only one of several factors used to determine your eligibility for financial aid.
- Current law protects most of a parents' net worth, except for 5.65 percent which is used in the financial aid need analysis.
- The number of family members in college can significantly affect your eligibility for aid. The more family members enrolled in higher education, the higher your need for financial assistance.
- A farm is not considered an asset on the FAFSA if it is the parent's principal place of residency and they participate in its operation.
- A dependent student is expected to contribute 35 percent of his or her net worth.
- The government does not consider your parents' home equity or retirement funds when calculating

Application Processing and Deadlines

You can file the 2007–2008 FAFSA anytime after January 1, 2007, and we urge you do so electronically at the FAFSA website (www.fafsa.ed.gov) because processing time is one-to-two weeks faster than paper processing. Also, there are built-in online edits to help you detect and correct errors before you transmit your application, resulting in more timely delivery of your financial aid funds. (Note that you can still complete a paper FAFSA; forms are available in the SFAS office.)

To file electronically, you must already have a U. S. Department of Education (USDE) PIN. Your parents will also need their own PIN if they plan to sign electronically. If you do not have a PIN, apply for one at www.pin.ed.gov.

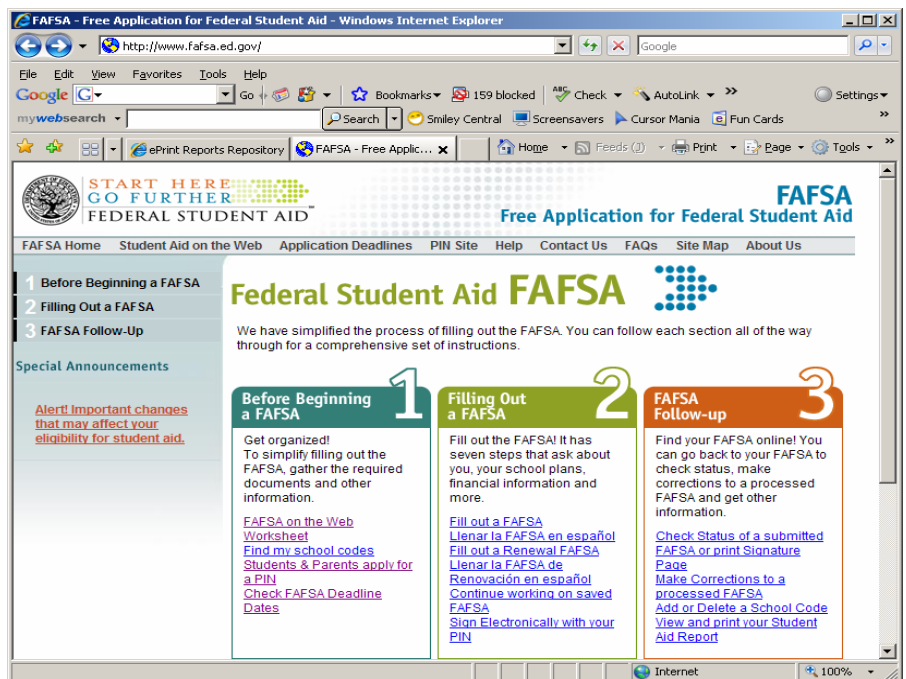
If you (and your parents) are NJ residents, you will also receive a Student Eligibility Notice (SEN) from the NJ Higher Education Student Assistance Authority (NJHESAA). The SEN is not final until SFAS has confirmed your eligibility by reviewing your financial aid file, registration status, and the status of your academic progress (SAP). Be sure that NJIT is indicated on the SEN as the college you are attending. If it is not, send the necessary correction directly to NJHESAA.

Once you have a PIN, return to the FAFSA website and complete the 07–08 FAFSA. When you are finished, be sure to click the “Provide Electronic Signature” link to submit your signature. Also be sure to indicate whether you are signing as a parent or a student. (If you are signing as a parent, you must provide information about the student.) To ensure full consideration for all forms of financial aid, you must file the FAFSA by **March 15, 2007**. Be sure to include NJIT’s institutional code, **002621**, in Step Six. The USDE offers a customer-service line (1-800-433-3243) that you can call to check the status of your application, or you can check the status online by clicking the “Check status of a submitted FAFSA or Print Signature Page.” *(continued on next page.)*

Once your FAFSA has been processed (approximately one-to-two weeks), you will receive a Student Aid Report (SAR) both in the mail and electronically. Review your SAR for accuracy. To edit information, or to add NJIT as a college choice, make the appropriate changes, sign the SAR, and submit it to the SFAS office with any documentation needed to verify the accuracy of the changes. SFAS will electronically transmit the corrections to the federal Central Processing System (CPS), and, if appropriate, to NJHESAA for Tuition Aid Grants (TAG).

If NJIT is listed on your SAR, SFAS will receive your financial aid application *electronically*. If additional information is needed to confirm your financial aid eligibility, you will receive a request, either electronically or on paper. You must appropriately respond to this request for your application to receive further consideration. To ensure that your financial aid funds disburse at the start of the Fall 2007 semester, you must submit any requested documentation to SFAS by **May 15, 2007**.

Processing of 2007–2008 financial aid awards begins immediately after Spring 2007 semester grades are posted. Your academic transcript will be reviewed to determine whether you are meeting the minimum standards for SAP for financial aid. You also must be registered for the Fall 2007 semester and have submitted all documentation required in order for us to complete your file. Files are processed in order of file completion date, so it is extremely important that you promptly respond to any requests for information, which you will receive through your UCID e-mail account and as a Highlander Pipeline personal announcement.

Summer Aid Application Procedures

Summer Financial Aid Request Forms will be available at the Student Financial Aid Services (SFAS) office after April 3, 2007, or anytime online at www.njit.edu/info/faforms. Before you request funding, be sure that you are registered for all summer courses you plan to take and are working toward a degree. You must also be meeting the minimum standards for Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP), which is reviewed after Spring-semester grades are posted. **The deadline to request summer aid is July 15.**

To be eligible for a summer loan, you must meet the following criteria:

- You must be enrolled for at least 6 credits.
- Summer eligibility is limited to your grade level loan maximum minus any loan amount already received for the 2006–2007 academic year.
- The cost for the credits and length of the term enrolled, minus the expected family contribution and other financial aid resources received for the corresponding term determines the summer loan amount.
- Federal Direct PLUS (parent loans), NJ Class loans, and alternative loans are available if you have no remaining direct loan eligibility.

If you were a part-time student during the Fall 2006 or Spring 2007 semesters, or if you attended only one semester and are eligible for Federal Pell Grant, you may have remaining Federal Pell Grant eligibility for summer. It is a good idea to review summer aid possibilities with your financial aid counselor before you register for classes.

Stay Abreast of Your Financial Aid Status

Do not wait until the last minute or until it is too late to provide missing documents or to sign student-loan promissory notes. Using NJIT's Web for Students page, you can access your NJIT financial aid records online at anytime. You can determine what awards have been disbursed and whether SFAS is waiting for outstanding documents from you before being able to continue processing your aid.

To view your financial aid record, go to <http://my.njit.edu> and log on to your Highlander Pipeline account using your UCID and password, then follow these steps:

1. Click the **Student Services** tab along the top of the page.
2. Click the **Student Services** link in the "Web For Students" area of the page.
3. Select the relevant financial aid link under the "Financial Aid" column (or from the menu along the top of the page).

Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) Impacts Your Financial Aid Eligibility

To receive grants, scholarships, loans, or work-study awards, you must be making Financial Aid Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) at NJIT. In general, full-time students must successfully complete at least 24 credits after completing one academic year. The expected credit completion rate for part-time students is pro-rated. Additionally, undergraduate students, after their second year of attendance at NJIT, must have a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.0.

Graduate students must have a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.0 after their first year of attendance at NJIT. For further details on SAP standards, please refer to the Satisfactory Academic Progress Policy for Student Financial Aid. It is published in the university catalog, on the SFAS Web site (www.njit.edu/finaid), and is disseminated to students with their Financial Aid Award Notifications. You can also request a copy from SFAS.

Your academic progress is monitored once a year, after the Spring semester. If you do not meet the standards for SAP, you will be ineligible for federal, state, and institutional aid, including loans and student employment. However, you may request reinstatement of your financial aid by submitting a written appeal to the Financial Aid SAP Appeals Committee.

Before preparing an appeal, you are encouraged to meet with your academic advisor to discuss academic achievement. Appeals must contain a thorough explanation of the circumstances that contributed to your failure to meet the progress standards, as well as a realistic academic plan for improvement.

The deadlines to appeal are July 15 for combined Summer, Fall, and Spring; September 1 for combined Fall and Spring; and January 15 for only Spring.

Three Major Types of Aid

There are three major types of aid offered by the U. S. Department of Education (USDE)—grants, loans, and Federal Work-Study. *Grants* do not have to be repaid. *Loans* are borrowed money and must be repaid, typically with interest. *Federal Work-Study* (FWS) provides income from a part-time job. Because it is money that you earn by working, it does not have to be repaid. The benefit of FWS is that you do not have to declare the earnings as income on your next year’s FAFSA, which may result in more aid for the upcoming year.

Federal Pell Grants, ACGs, and National SMART Grants are awarded according to rules set by Congress. If a you are eligible, NJIT will award you one or more of these grants.

Campus-based programs are administered by NJIT’s office of SFAS. The USDE funds the campus-based programs based upon the amount for which the school has applied to receive, the amount available nationally, and the amount the school utilized in the previous year. The school then awards these funds to students according to federal guidelines.

Because funds are limited, applying early increases your chances of receiving available campus-based aid:

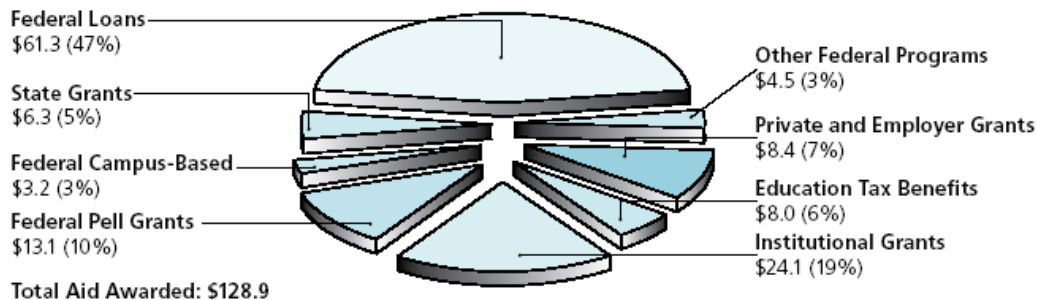
- Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG)
- Federal Work-Study (FWS)
- Federal Perkins Loan

The William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan (Direct Loan) program lets you and your parents, if you are eligible, borrow from USDE instead of from a bank or other lending institution.

This allows borrowers to work with a single entity, USDE, through its servicing centers when repaying loans or dealing with loan-related issues. There are four types of Direct Loans:

- Federal Direct Stafford Loans (subsidized)
- Federal Direct Stafford Loans (unsubsidized)
- Federal Direct PLUS Loans (for parents and graduate or professional students)
- Federal Direct Consolidation Loans (to combine federal education loan debts)

As of July 1, 2006, eligible graduate or professional students may receive Federal Direct PLUS loans or Federal PLUS loans. Like parent PLUS borrowers, Grad PLUS borrowers will undergo a credit check before borrowing and will enter repayment on the date of the final loan disbursement.
