About Paul C. Hausser

For nearly four decades, Paul Hausser served as mentor and coach, teacher and administrator to students of Newark College of Engineering and New Jersey Institute of Technology. He was fencing coach from 1953 to 1983, and his fencing teams recorded more than 200 victories with an overall winning percentage of .780 and two North Atlantic championships. He also coached baseball from 1956 to 1973. As professor and chairman of physical education, he was responsible for expanding the program from two to 45 course offerings. As associate director of physical education and athletics, he represented the department as liaison for the university in the expansion and renovation of physical education facilities. He was inducted into the NJIT Athletics Hall of Fame in 1990, and retired with professor emeritus status in 1991.

Hausser earned a BS in education at Panzer College of Physical Education and Hygiene, a certificate in physical therapy from Columbia College of Physicians and Surgeons in 1951, and an MA and a professional diploma from Columbia Teachers College in 1954 and 1955. He did research on the training of bilateral amputees in conjunction with New York State Rehabilitation Hospital, and his final report was published in Archives of Physical Medicine in June 1956. He served two tours of duty in the U.S. Marine Corps, the first during World

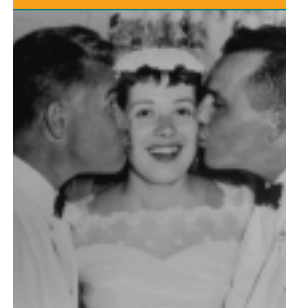

War II in the infantry and as a supply sergeant, and the second, in 1951-52, as an athletic trainer at Camp Lejeune, NC.

He was chosen by the Class of '58 as class advisor and honored in the 1958 yearbook for this role. "Professor Hausser meets every man at NCE in the freshman gym class, at which time he promotes an interest in student activities. In addition to having a significant role in directing athletics at NCE, Professor Hausser is always available to assist any man in any phase of the activity program," read the yearbook citation.

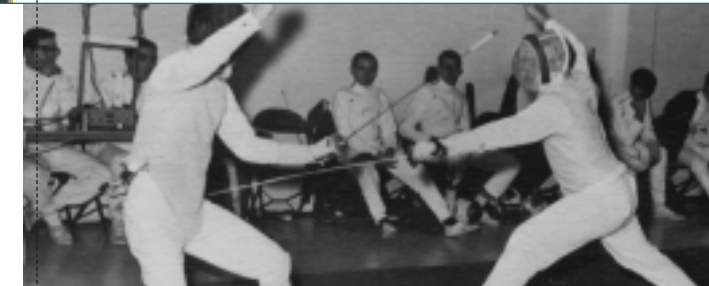
Remembered by his students for a "human approach" to athletics emphasizing fun as well as skill, he was an avid supporter of youth athletics, particularly soccer. At his death in 2000, the Hausser Family and the New Jersey Youth Soccer Association established the Paul Hausser Memorial Scholarship Fund which awards scholarships to deserving high school seniors who intend to go on to college and pursue a career in education.



The Paul C. Hausser Fencing Fund honors Coach Hausser by helping NJIT to support the scholar athletes in its Division I Athletics Program. The fund will support the fencing program and provide scholarships for its athletes that will allow a scholar-athlete to reach his or her full potential both in the classroom and on the playing field. Such scholarships allow the university to sustain its unique educational and social mission - making higher education accessible to as broad a segment of society as possible - and permit our coaches to recruit the best and brightest student-athletes from around the world.
