Report: Enrolling Student Survey Undergraduates, Fall 2007

November 2007

Executive Summary

The Enrolling Student survey for Fall 2007 was revised for deployment via the web. The survey instrument consisted of 45 questions concerning their goals, enrollment decisions, comparisons to other colleges and commitment to finishing their degree. Tables and graphics summarizing the results are attached. Undergraduate students are attracted to NJIT mainly because it is a good value for their money. Highlights of the findings include:

Goals

- NJIT students are focused on career and pecuniary goals. The top three goals are: *prepare for a career, attain skills that will be useful on a job*, and *improve ability to make more money*.
- Women reported significantly higher mean scores on *improve interpersonal skills and increase awareness of different philosophies, cultures and way of life.*

Enrollment

- Reasonable cost, NJIT's academic reputation and availability of financial aid are the main drivers of student's enrollment decision.
- Academic facilities, Honor College, size of student population, diversity of student population, and extracurricular activities are statistically significant drivers for women's decisions to attend when compared to that of men.
- Relatives, friends or acquaintances, internet, college visit, high school teachers, principals or staff and guidance counselor are the top five sources of learning about NJIT.
- A campus visit/information session (34%) and attendance of an open house (19%) were the factors that most influenced students' decision to apply. Thirty-eight percent of women reported that a campus visit/information session most influenced their decision to apply compared to only 33 percent of men. Campus visit/information session (36%) had the most influence on their decision to attend NJIT.
- Three quarters of the of students visited the campus before making the decision to enroll. Parents were the strongest influence on the student's decision to apply (42%) and to attend (49%) NJIT.

Comparison to Other Colleges

- NJIT was the first choice for 61% of the students. Overwhelmingly, our major competitor is Rutgers University. Nine percent of the sample reported Rutgers as their first choice.
- In comparison to other colleges, NJIT was rated 3.38 or higher on all factors except visit by admission staff to your school.
- In comparison to other colleges (external and internal), NJSOA is rated highly in contact after you were admitted, contact after first inquiry, and contact with current students. SLA is also rated highly in contact after being admitted and contact with current students. (see p. 28).

Academic Situation

- First generation college students comprised 43% of the respondents.
- Twenty-seven percent of the students reported that they were not placed in the appropriate level mathematics course. Ninety-three percent were placed lower than they expected.
- Eighteen percent of the students reported that they were not placed in the appropriate level english course. Ninety-one percent were placed lower than they expected.

Commitment

- Seventy-one percent are very strongly committed to finishing their degree.
- Fifty-three percent intend to attain a Masters degree and twenty-six percent earn a doctorate degree.

Recommendations

- NJIT should emphasize that it offers good education at a reasonable cost and concentrate on enhancing our internet presence.
- All colleges need to make there website more attractive to prospective students. (see p. 28)

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Procedures and Sample

All FTFTF students were extracted from the official SURE enrollment file for participation in the sample. This allow us to track the progress of the cohort through their academic career at NJIT. In addition, the web system is now in place to better serve the anticipated structural change of delivering freshman seminar by college/program. An email invitation and reminder emails were sent to all first-time, full-time freshmen (FTFTF). The survey instrument consisted of 45 questions concerning their goals, enrollment decision, comparisons to other colleges, commitment to finishing their degree and on the placement exams for mathematics and english. A sample size of 414 students was achieved, representing 56% of FTFTF).

The summary of student demographics is shown in Figure 1.




Student Mean Ratings of the Importance of Goals in their enrolment decision by Year

Student Mean Ratings of the Importance of Goals in their enrolment decision by Gender



Student Mean Ratings of the Importance of Goals in their enrolment decision by School





Factors in Enrollment Decision by Year







Q-34. How Did You Learn about NJIT? (n = 414)















Q-38: Who Most Influenced Your Decision to Attend? by School








Rate NJIT in Comparison to Other Colleges by Year




Rate NJIT in Comparison to Other Colleges by Gender



Rate NJIT in Comparison to Other Colleges By Ethnicity




Comparison to other colleges, highest rated factors* in enrollment decision by school






Q-29: Have either of your parents graduated from college? (n = 413)




Q-31: Your approximate high school average: (n = 412)



Were you placed in appropriate level of English N=413




English: Placed higher or lower than expected N=70



Math: Placed higher or lower than expected N=109






Q-32: How involved were you in high school extracurricular activities? (n = 413)




Q-33: How involved are you generally in clubs, church and other organizations outside school? (n = 412)
